- **Tackle wicked problems** - invest in start-ups, Research and Development (R&D) and technology testbeds to address issues such as urban cooling, road safety and social cohesion.

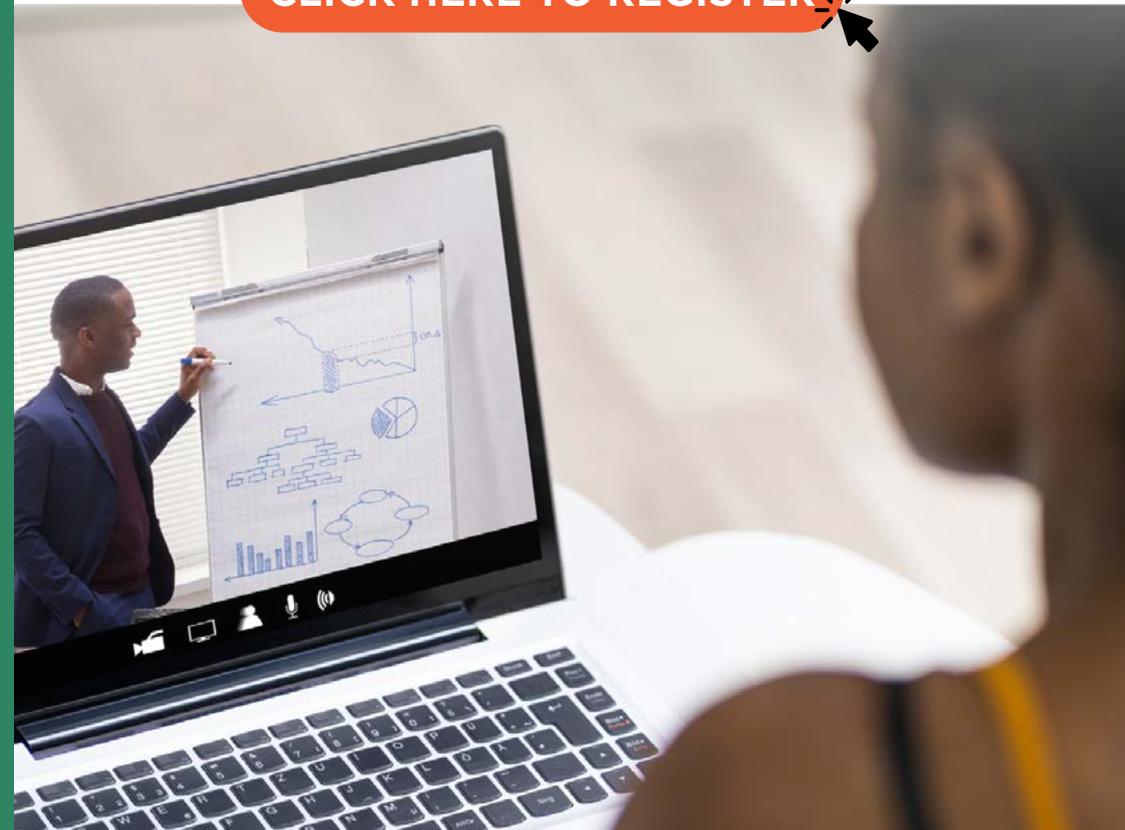
