
Global tensions are escalating, and Australia's security outlook is more complex than ever as threats continue to rise against our values and sovereignty. The challenges facing the nation are numerous, varied and actors are employing evolving techniques of approach to gain a tactical advantage. The world is encountering a different approach to warfare, in the arena of cyber, and there is a hunger for intelligence and the power it wields. To defend and protect our national interests, people, systems, and infrastructure we need to think differently. A unified, robust approach is necessary to aid in the defence of our capabilities, safeguard our communities and keep our borders secure.

As the effects of the Covid-19 pandemic continue to ripple across the world, more online engagement and the rapid increase in remote working has created greater opportunities for cyber-attacks and espionage. This is also true of online recruitment for extremist groups. While the overall terrorism caseload in Australia has decreased in the last year, there has been a significant rise in radicalisation and specific-issue grievances. Coronavirus imposed lockdowns meant isolated individuals spent more time online, becoming more susceptible to extremist messaging.

The defence, security and emergency management sectors face the challenging task of remaining prepared in the face of uncertainty. As they employ emerging methods and technology to combat the most impending threats, three Nareas remain a major focus.

- **1. Cybersecurity** With the average Australian spending a substantial amount of time online from remote locations, the risk of data breaches, attacks on systems of national significance and fraud have increased exponentially.
- **2. National Security Innovation** As data, privacy and sovereignty play a more important role than ever in protecting Australia's national security interests, developing innovative technologies to improve our capabilities is vital.
- **3. Terrorism and Communities** Lone actor terrorism threats and protests that may turn violent continue to threaten community safety.

Public Sector Network's **8th Australian Security Summit 2022 (AuSec)** will examine in-depth these areas that remain paramount to national security. Through collaboration, preparedness, and support for those on the frontline, sector leaders can continue to adapt to combat issues as they arise. The integration of new technologies and innovations is critical to the continued success of protecting the nation and its citizens.
